#### From the Pastor

Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

...and after a winter like we have just experienced, the news of resurrection and the evidence of new life is especially welcome!

I spoke with a young man recently who had just moved here from Colorado-- in the middle of our winter. He said that he misses mountains – which is no surprise -- but was dismayed to find such short and ragged trees. "Yes..." I replied, "no mountains. But the ragged trees are not so typical. Between an ice storm and the deep freeze we are all a bit anxious to see what comes back and how it will look. We are hoping...for improvement."

And it has begun! As I write this the bright green of new leaves on the early budding trees and the soft ground cover of speedwell in the woods are softening our stick jungles. Wild plum and pear trees are blooming, and redbuds are ready to burst.

We are lucky to live in the Northern Hemisphere where the Passover (and therefore Easter) celebrations happen in spring-- for more than our woods and our yards are suffering from dead bushes and broken limbs. Our hearts are ragged as well --weary from the pandemic, full of losses in a lost year, hoping for softening, blooming, and improvement.

During the month of April we will be planning for resumption of in-person worship (while also continuing

to offer online options). How helpful that we are doing this in the season of Easter! What a perfect time to plan for something new, even if we begin with raggedy sticks. It reminds me of a verse of the Easter hymn, Now the Green Blade Rises by John Crum:

When our hearts are weary, grieving, or in pain, your touch can call us back to life again. Field of our hearts that dead and bare have been--Love has come again like wheat arising green.

He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

#### Directions to the Cemetery for Easter Sunday:

Starting at 6th (Hwy 51) and Western, take Hwy 51 west until you see the 2<sup>nd</sup> cemetery sign, ~ 10.7 miles.

(If you get to route 86 going to Perry, you've gone too far.)

Vasser road goes north (right) and there is a house close by.

Just after the house (.25 miles) a dirt road goes off to the right.

Take this road back east .8 miles (crossing a cattle guard) until you get to the cemetery which is on the left.

#### FROM YOUR PRESIDENT



There are still many unanswered questions like will we need a booster, will the vaccine keep us from the variants, so we move forward with faith.

In May when we gather to worship all conversations need to be outside and I heard one member say we can bring our coffee in a thermos.

Thanks for staying strong and keeping church together. I can hardly wait to see you, when you're comfortable coming back!

# Wonder

For a new perspective on Bible accounts you've heard over and over, play "I Wonder" with children and adults alike. Similar to "I Spy," it encourages a deeper dive into familiar passages. Simply explore ideas that aren't detailed in the Bible, starting with the phrase "I wonder."

#### For example:

- I wonder if any Roman soldier was standing in the back not mocking Jesus (Matthew 27:27-31). If so, what was he thinking as others threw about insults?
- I wonder how long it took Joseph of Arimathea to cut his own tomb out of the rock (Matthew 27:57-60). What did he think about as he worked?
- The day after Jesus' ascension, I wonder which disciple spoke first at breakfast — and what he said.

Scholars may have chimed in on some of these ponderings, but there's likely no right answer. Playing "I Wonder" can help you slow down to really pay attention and experience more of a Bible passage — especially one you seem to know by rote.

Add meaning to this year's Easter celebration by letting your wonder wander during Holy Week. Then continue the practice whenever you're eager to gain new insights on the "old, old story ... of Jesus and his love."
































# What you do:


- 1. Decide how many colors you want to use, and set aside one cup for each color.

The topics will include:


