From the Pastor

Not long after I moved to Oklahoma I wondered to someone why I basically saw either winter wheat or winter wheat in the farming areas –why is there not more truck farming and crop variety I asked? Well, came the answer, there are soil issues, but even more – Oklahoma has one of the highest (if not the highest) freeze-thaw cycles in the country. You have to be a particularly hardy plant to thrive here. “The sign of spring in Oklahoma”, I was told, “is a frozen daffodil.”

I don't know how true that is, but I have certainly seen that fickle freeze-thaw ratio in action in the 31 years I've lived here, and it has certainly been in view the last few weeks. And frankly, the pandemic has taken on that same feel! We're finally on our way to a 'thaw' cycle after December and January's Omicron freeze. Barring another troublesome variant, we are moving closer and closer to that time we long for when we not only gather in the Nave for worship but in the Parish Hall for Coffee Hour. And no iced coffee allowed, just steaming hot liquid and warm conversation with friends in the faith.

We are subject to the vagaries of nature, whether it is freeze, thaw or viruses. Through it all, though, we have a God who is faithful to us without wavering. It brings to mind the words of a familiar hymn (by Thomas O. Chisholm):

*Summer and winter and springtime and harvest,
Sun, moon and stars in their courses above
Join with all nature in manifold witness
To thy great faithfulness, mercy and love
Great is Thy faithfulness, great is Thy faithfulness
Morning by morning new mercies I see
All I have needed Thy hand hath provided
Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me.*

(No apologies if that hymn gets stuck in your head today!)

God's Grace In Motion

Bishop's 2021 Annual Report (partial)

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. –Psalm 46:1

Dear Friends:

2021 has been another difficult and challenging year for our synod, our church, our nation and our world. COVID continues to disrupt plans, schedules and, most of all, lives. Many of our congregations have wrestled with when and how to return to in-person worship and other programming, then when to re-institute COVID protocols as first Delta and then Omicron swept across our region. Pastors, Deacons and congregations leaders I have spoken with are exhausted. Added to that is all the economic turmoil in the world around us, the ongoing plagues of racism, violence and divisiveness. It has been quite a year! Still, ministry continues as congregations reach out to those in need, find creative and adaptive ways to share the Gospel and give thanks and praise to the God who is our refuge and strength, especially in times like these.

Transitions

In the synod office, a lot of our attention this past year has been focused on transitions. On the one hand, eight (20%) of our congregations are currently at some stage of the call process. Some have been waiting for a very long time, as the current “pool” of candidates is fairly shallow. The lack of available interim and supply pastors has only made these transitions harder. On the other hand, in July, we were excited and happy to welcome Pastor Becca Middeke-Conlin as our new Director of Evangelical Mission and Associate for Youth and Young Adult Ministry. Trinity in Clinton, OK brought it's ministry to conclusion in July. Ascension, Del City, Redeemer, Oklahoma City, and St. Mark's, Midwest City are nearing the end of a consolidation process. And, sadly, we lost Pastor Don Marshall, the executive director of Oaks Indian Mission, when he died unexpectedly at the end of the December so that ministry is in transition as well.

Building Bridges

At the end of May, Building Bridges, our synod Anti-Racism team, co-hosted a digital ELCA panel on Race and the Church held in conjunction with the John Hope Franklin Symposium for Racial Reconciliation as part of the 100th Anniversary of the Tulsa Race Massacre. We also joined Prince of Peace in Tulsa for a Unity Walk, which was very meaningful and fun. The Team continues to work to provide resources for congregations doing anti-racism work in the synod and to sponsor programming to support these efforts.

Reconciling in Christ (RIC)

At our Assembly in May, we passed a resolution calling for the synod to consider becoming a Reconciling in Christ Synod. In response, a task force was assembled and have been meeting regularly since the summer. Working with Reconciling Works, we have been participating in trainings and workshops so we might better lead our synod as we move toward becoming more open and welcoming to our LGBTQIA+ siblings and to walk with congregations as they consider joining us on this journey. Reconciling Works has helped us to understand that this is a process that people and congregations start in different places and that we need to meet people where they are and listen to one another care-fully as we move forward. There will be a report and workshop at our Synod Assembly in May. We currently have three RIC ministries in our synod: Good Shepherd, Fayetteville, Lord of Life, Edmond, and Servant's Table in Tulsa. A few others are considering entering this process. I encourage you to join us on this journey and get involved in the conversation in the months ahead.

Thanksgiving

Finally, I want to say a HUGE thank-you to our congregations and ministries for your support of synod ministry. It has been a rough year financially for many congregations, and yet, we have still received almost 90% of what we expected! That's an amazing blessing! Two of our smallest congregations have already told me they intend to *increase* their support for 2022! God bless you all for your generosity! Working together as a synod, I am convinced we will continue to put God's grace in motion in the coming year.

Please join me in praying that 2022 will be brighter and better than 2021, that COVID will finally back off, that the world becomes a more just and peaceful place, and that the Good News of Jesus' love and grace continues to be proclaimed, shared and heard. May the God who is a very present help in times of trouble be with us all in 2022.

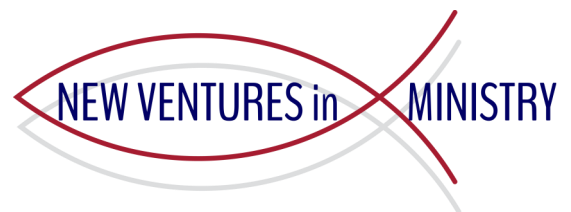

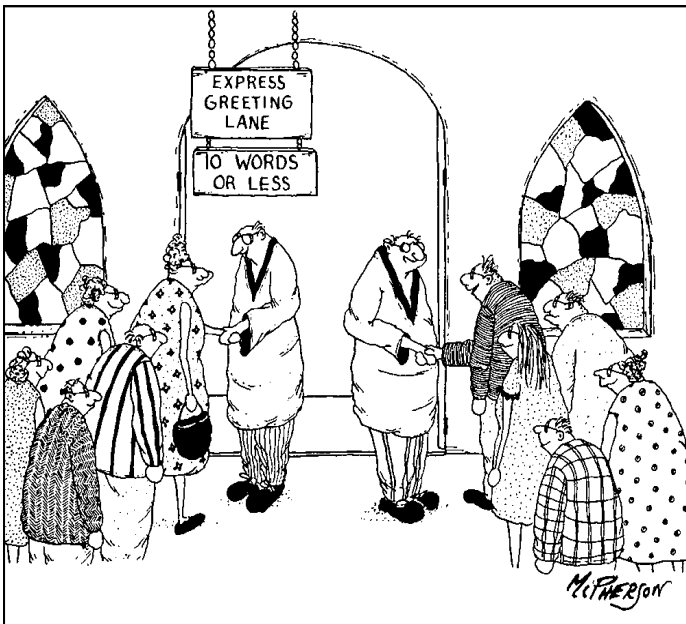
