
## To the Salem Lutheran Community,

These days unhospitable rhetoric abounds as issues of citizenship and immigration reveal an unwelcoming spirit in our country. While we may feel helpless about national events, let's remember to do what we have the power to do - extend welcome and hospitality in our own community.

Salem is currently working on a number of things involving welcoming and hospitality:

Our Call Committee is preparing to welcome a call candidate. All will be invited.

Members attending the Sunday School Class, Stranger God: Meeting Jesus in Disguise are examining how to become more welcoming to the strangers. Join us!

The RIC continues to work on ways for Salem to extend a welcome to people in need of a church community. Come, or come back, on February 7 at 11:30am in the Library.

During this time, please pray that all of us discover new sources of love and hospitality within ourselves, and ways to share that love with our siblings in Christ Jesus.

February is Black History Month. According to Pew Research, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is one of the least diverse denominations in the US by race/ethnicity, with about 96% of members being white. Despite this, Lutherans have some interesting connections to Black History.

The Rev. Jehu Jones was the first African-American Lutheran pastor. Originally ordained in 1832 to be a missionary to Liberia, he instead settled in Philadelphia. He founded and pastored St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, the first African-American Lutheran congregation there. Despite his best efforts to fundraise, the Pennsylvania Synod withheld financial aid, and the church building was foreclosed. Even so, he continued serving St. Paul's for many years before passing away in 1852. He's remembered by many as a trailblazer in our church's journey toward justice.

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his father were born Michael King. In 1934, their church sent Rev. King, Sr. to Germany for a meeting of the World Baptist Alliance. Appalled by the Nazi regime, the Alliance passed a resolution denouncing racism. While he was there, the elder King toured historical sites from Luther's life and felt inspired to change his and his son's name in Luther's honor. During his nonviolent struggle for racial justice, Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke to the ALC Luther League (a precursor to the ELCA Youth Gathering) in 1961. He is remembered in our church as a reformer of society and a martyr.

In the Arkansas-Oklahoma Synod, we also care about racial justice. In 2016, our Synod Assembly passed a resolution calling on congregations to "address the realities of racism." Several study groups, including at Salem, convened to learn about racial injustice. Several congregations throughout the synod participate in Unity Walks for justice. Salem members are often involved in MLK Jr. commemorations. In 2023, as a part of our Reconciling in Christ process, we included the following in our Welcome Statement: "We are committed to work for racial equity and justice within and through our community."

Although it is the shortest month, February commemorates one of the most important subjects in history. I encourage everyone to take some time to learn something new about Black History.

You are invited to join members from around the AOK Synod to travel to our companion synod, the Morogoro Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. We will be traveling around the dates of July 3-20 and the cost for the trip is approximately \$3500. That will cover your airfare to/from your local airport to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, food, housing and transportation while in Tanzania and a few tourist adventures. While in the Morogoro area, you will have the opportunity to work with local ministries on building repairs and maintenance, give basic medical care (or if you have the training, more advance care), get to know the people of the Morogoro Diocese as we travel to local congregations and ministries (especially as we will be there during their bishop's election) or a combination of all these opportunities. **Bishop Elizabeth Eaton**, who has served for the last 12 years, has announced that she will not go forward for a third term as Bishop and so at the Churchwide Assembly in July, representatives from all the synods will elect a new Presiding Bishop.


I don't have a crystal ball so I can't tell you who the next Presiding Bishop will be. I can only share with you what I think are the gifts and skills that person should have. The top of these are a sense of call, organization, strategic planning, a passion for the church, a deep sense of humility and the ability to take very little personally. The job of Presiding Bishop is so large and encompassing and we put a lot of responsibility on them while at the same time they do not have as much power and authority as we think they have. They also get blamed for a lot that is beyond their control and there is no pleasing everyone. When pastoral messages are made about wildfires in California or war in Palestine and Israel, the Presiding Bishop is both praised by some and also vilified by other because what they said

was too political, or not political enough, or ignored one issue while focusing on scripture, or was too focus on an issue and not enough on scripture. The criticism, especially in our era of instant communication and social media, are constant and deep.

The next Presiding Bishop will not be able to do the job that they will be called and elected to do, without us, the people of the ELCA. Let us all agree now that we will support them, cheering them on with just as much love and enthusiasm on the day they are elected as the day they leave office.

And in these last 9 1/2 months of Bishop Eaton's term, I also encourage you to continue to support her, continue to pray for her and continue to demonstrate God's love to her and to all of God's people.


